The NICKO and the Garden Cities

Those of you who are regular readers know that the main purpose of universal membership is to help develop duplicate bridge by revitalising our affiliated bridge clubs, bringing you more players and making the EBU more representative of club members.

The National Inter Club Knock Out Competition is specifically aimed at EBU affiliated clubs, and we want to ensure that the competition is truly representative of clubs and their players. In the past eight years, however, there has been a substantial decline in NICKO entries. We believe this is because the competition's main ethos of attracting bona fide club players has become clouded. In order to reverse the trend we are looking at a proposal to ensure that any player who represents a club has played in that club a certain number of times in the preceding year. We would like to hear from our clubs to find out the reasons why they enter/do not enter this competition, and what, if anything, would revitalise it for them. The EBU Tournament Committee has suggested that players who represent a club should have played 12 times in the preceding year. However, we have already had representations from clubs that understand the reasoning behind this

proposal but feel that the suggested number of 12 is too high. We will not be making a decision about this until October at the earliest when we will have a better idea of playing patterns and when you will have had time to tell us your views.

The Garden Cities Trophy is for the winners of each county association's inter club teams of eight competition for affiliated clubs and this would be subject to similar conditions as the NICKO.

Rugby Village

From the Maternity Ward - Rugby Village Bridge Club is born!!

As Club Focus in its present form ends, Rugby Village Bridge Club is born. We are one of the newest and youngest bridge clubs in England. Following the decision by Rugby Bridge Club not to affiliate to the English Bridge Union, Rugby Village Bridge Club was founded in March 2010, because we believed that affiliation to the EBU confers many benefits to both players and organisers.

Our current venue for several of the courses and playing sessions is Dunchurch Village Hall, which is a fantastic venue some three miles from Rugby town centre. Other courses, including the beginners' courses, take place at the teachers' homes. Dunchurch Village Hall was chosen because of the quality of its accommodation and parking facilities. It was opened in 2003 and complies fully with the building requirements of the Disability Discrimination Act, which is excellent news for any players with limited mobility.

Nicky Cook, the founder, wanted to establish a club where there is always a welcome for players of any level and genuine friendliness is paramount. Her aim is to encourage players to learn bridge with EBU qualified teachers and then to ease them into duplicate bridge through coached sessions until they find their feet. This will enable players to be integrated with the duplicate pairs sessions, held on Monday evenings currently, in a supportive environment when they feel ready. To this end the club holds events to suit all levels of play from beginners to Level 3.

These are exciting times for us. There are many events we want to run and lots we want to do, but we are trying to walk before we run.

Master Points

Master Points are extremely important to the majority of our players as they are the measurement of an EBU member's lifetime achievement for playing duplicate bridge. We want to ensure that our players get the recognition they deserve and we believe that this is just as important locally, amongst their fellow players, as well as nationally in the magazine. We will be providing your clubs with details of MP promotions so that this information can be used to announce your players' achievements in the club, in the club newsletter and on the club website. We will also be encouraging our counties to recognise the achievements of their members and to publicise their MP promotions on the county website and in the county newsletter.

Universal Membership will bring to the EBU up to 20,000 new members. Many of these will be experienced players who may have a significant number of Master Points waiting to be registered. Also many of these players will consistently win Master Points in the future. All this means that in the first two or three years we can expect a large number of MP promotions – up to 20,000 each year or even possibly more.

The current framework was designed for incremental increases not for a sudden change of this magnitude and simply cannot sensibly cope.

After months of consultation with Aylesbury and the Tournament Committee it was determined that to continue as we have done in the past would be too costly an exercise, even requiring an increase in Pay to Play subscriptions. It would also have resulted in us having to ignore the results of our consultation on the contents of *English Bridge* via the Club Committee, as the magazine would have been filled with lists of names drastically curtailing its editorial features.

It is intended instead to use the EBU website as the primary publicity vehicle, with *English Bridge* used more selectively. In addition, individual promotions will be posted in the member's personal area on the website.

As of 1 April 2010, all members of affiliated clubs get their Master Points credited automatically, but don't forget to send in those old paper ones.

There are three elements that affect club members:

- There will be four landmark promotions. When you accumulate 5000 local points (Master Rank), you will receive a good quality gift and free entry into the Masters event within the EBU Ranked Masters Pairs.
- All other promotions will enter a four-monthly Master Point draw with three prizes – 1st prize is two nights Dinner, Bed & Breakfast for two people at a Barceló Hotel.
- The winner of the most local (black) points in each affiliated club's events will enter the new Annual Prize Draw with a first prize of £400. The annual local and national awards will continue.

Details of the new framework are on the EBU website at www.ebu.co.uk/masterpoints/. Resources are finite, but we believe we have distributed them more evenly across the spectrum of players.

We intend to review the scheme within a year to take account of your feedback, which should be sent to mpr@ebu.co.uk.



Training

Free TD Training and Club Teacher Training Courses for Affiliated Clubs

Under Universal Membership affiliated clubs are invited to send a second club member to a Tournament Director course free of charge where a club sends a full paying member to any of the club TD courses. The offer is on a 'like for like' basis - so when a club books a place (from 1 to 4 courses), it receives the equivalent free for another member of the same club. To take advantage of the scheme both the paying member and the free member must be booked at the same time, and the booking must be made by the registered secretary of the club.

The scheme applies to all courses that commenced after 1 April 2010. So the free place scheme does not apply to Bramhall and Trowbridge which both began before April 1st.

Each club will be offered one free teacher training session in any 24 month period to assist with the development of the club and to attract new members. These Club Teacher Training Courses will be of two days duration and are not yet finalised. Full details will be published on the EBU website as soon as possible.

The full three-day Partner-Teacher training courses (not free) are still available independently of the free club teacher courses. For full details see www.ebu.co.uk/education/partnerteacher/courses.htm

All clubs who take advantage of our free teacher training and tournament director training will agree to remain affiliated to the EBU for a further three full years after the year that the training course has taken place, e.g. if the training takes place in 2010-2011, the club must remain affiliated until the affiliation year beginning April 2014.

Bridge Tales

Getting a kick out of bridge...

Our hero sits South and hears the following sequence.

South West North East
2NT No 3NT Dbl

He plays East for the missing points and goes one off when East has a Yarborough. The following week he plays against the same pair and has the same sequence. This time he spots West kicking East under the table before East doubles. He plays West for the missing points and makes an overtrick.

The third week he again plays the same pair. His partner opens 2NT, and he has to decide whether to look for a slam or settle for 3NT with this borderline hand:

♠ K 7 6 ♥ Q 7 4 3 ♦ 8 7 2 ♣ A Q 7 5

No problem! He passes 2NT and kicks East. Do you know the score for 2NT redoubled plus three overtricks?
